Week in review Last weekend's annual 'switch-on' of Christmas lights in Aberdeen signalled the start of winter. No ice or snow yet, but plenty of wet and stormy weather, and even moderately cold temperatures (5-8°C) can mean increased illness and higher death rates. What has this meant for health and care services in Grampian in the past 7 days?

Primary care deals with most of the increase in winter related illness and with operational pressure equivalent to G-OPES level 3 (the highest is 4) over the past week, some practices are reporting high demand associated with coughs and colds. In the Emergency Department at ARI, there has been a small increase overall in the number attendances (an average of 7 patients more each day) however, in general, seasonal trends mean ED attendances tend to be lower in winter than in the spring/summer – perhaps a surprising fact to many.

The biggest cause of pressure on hospitals in winter is the increasing number of people who require to be admitted from an ED. An additional 5 patients each day (on average) were admitted to ARI last week compared to the previous week. This may not sound like much, but it is part of an increasing trend - we are now admitting an average of 9 more patients per day from ED than we were in 2018. Older people, those with chronic respiratory conditions, heart disease, and associated illness typically drive the increases needed in health care services during the winter months. And sure enough, this has played out in Grampian over the past week with increases in general medical specialties.

We have also seen an increase, from the previous week, in the number of beds closed for staffing or maintenance reasons. This has affected our acute hospitals particularly, although mental health and community beds are also affected. With more demand and less capacity, this has resulted in extremely high levels of bed occupancy. Every day last week, daytime bed occupancy was over 100% in our main hospitals, and this means high turnover for patients, and extreme pressure for staff. At the beginning of November, 150 (10%) of our available beds across the system were occupied by people who are medically fit for discharge but delayed in hospital whilst waiting for care home places or social care support. 99 (66%) of those individuals were in community hospitals and Royal Cornhill. This is part of a worsening trend since the summer months when 7% of all available beds were occupied by patient delays.

Ending on a hopeful note, hospital activity relating to COVID-19 has reduced compared to the previous week, although 23 beds were occupied at the start of this week and there were ward closures (one partial) due to outbreaks. 'Flu levels are markedly lower this year than last. Our respiratory position may seem like cold comfort amongst the other pressures, but we can be somewhat relieved we do not seem to be heading towards a triple peak of flu, covid and RSV as we were in December last year.
